Formas finales de las letras

Cinco letras del alfabeto hebreo tienen formas especiales cuando aparecen en posición final en una palabra:

1. Kaf final (ך)
2. Mem final (ם)
3. Nún final (ן)
4. Pé final (ף)
5. Tsáde final (ץ)

Estas formas finales ayudan a distinguir visualmente la posición de la

letra dentro de la palabra, facilitando la lectura.

Vocalización y signos diacríticos

La ausencia de vocales en la escritura tradicional
